Dr. Jessica Barry is a Staff Geriatrician with Queen's Geriatric Services and a Consultation Geriatrician at Molokai General Hospital. She is Assistant Clinical Professor, University of Hawaii, Geriatrics department and Supervising Geriatric Fellows in clinic and home visits. Dr. Barry has presented a Dementia Caregiver Education Series at the Queen's Medical Center and at Molokai General Hospital for caregivers of those with dementia. She also appears frequently on television and radio, addressing such topics as Caregiver Stress, Dealing with Alzheimer's, and the ABC's of Alzheimer's Disease.

Dr. Lois Ricci, a geriatric nurse practitioner/educator and consultant, is our guest speaker from Atlanta, Georgia. She holds Master's degrees in Gerontology and Nursing Education, and a Doctorate in Adult Education. Currently, she is a consultant for the Rosalynn Carter Institute for Caregiving, and adjunct faculty member and consultant with University of Georgia, Kennesaw State University and Clayton State University, where she teaches Gerontology courses and the Professional Development in Gerontology Certificate Class.

Gary Powell is the Executive Director of The Caregiver Foundation, a Hawaii-based not-for-profit agency, serving the practical and emotional needs of Caregivers and individuals needing care. He has a varied entrepreneurial background including, among many others, musician, author, landscape developer, retail store operator, theater director, CEO, facilities manager, school manager, counselor, teacher and throughout all of those, *caregiver*.

Kathy Wyatt is President of Hale Hau'oli Hawai'i, whose mission is to promote positive aging through community education programs, adult day care options, and caregiver support groups. She is a registered nurse with Master's degrees in Nursing and Business Administration.
